Washington, DC – The National Congress of American Indians (NCAI) today commended President Obama for honoring the late Billy Frank, Jr., member of the Nisqually Indian Tribe, as one of 17 recipients of the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

This nation's highest civilian honor, the Presidential Medal of Freedom is bestowed upon individuals "who have made especially meritorious contributions

"Billy was a tireless advocate for the rights of Native Americans," said Brian Cladoosby, President of NCAI and Chairman of the Swinomish Indian Tribal Community. "Billy's voice spoke for the salmon and the resources and most importantly for the children of our future so they may have the rights preserved for them more than a century ago."

Billy Frank, Jr. spent his life fighting for tribes' right to fish and protect their waters, and fiercely advocated for

sist member tribes in their role as natural resources co-managers following the Boldt Decision.

The Presidential Medal of Freedom is the latest in a long line of distinguished awards that Frank, Jr. has received in recognition of his extraordinary contribution to Indian Country. They include the Common Cause Award for Human Rights Efforts, the Albert Schweitzer Prize for Humanitarianism (past winners of which include President Jimmy Carter, former Surgeon General C. Everett Koop, and author Norman Cousins),

the American Indian Distinguished Service Award, the 2006 Wallace Stegner Award, and the Washington State Environmental Excellence Award. NCAI also recognized Frank with the Native American Leadership Award at its Annual Leadership Awards Banquet in 2011 for his lifelong dedication to preserve, protect, and advance tribal sovereignty, Native cultures and natural resource management.

Joining Billy Frank, Jr. as this year's recipients of the Medal of Freedom are baseball great Yogi Berra (posthumous), pub-

lic servant Bonnie Carroll, Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm (posthumous), music producer Emilio Estefan, singer Gloria Estefan, Congressman Lee Hamilton, space pioneer Katherine G. Johnson, baseball great Willie Mays, Senator Barbara Mikulski, conductor Itzhak Perlman, former EPA Director William Ruckelshaus, theater composer Stephen Sondheim, film director Steven Spielberg, singer Barbra Streisand, singer James Taylor, and civil rights leader Minru Yasui (posthumous).



With the holidays arriving we are always reminded of how thankful we are for our elders, our children and the resources that we can share with our families.

I would like to thank all of those who exercised their rights to vote in both tribal elections and local elections. I would like to congratulate the newly elected members Travis Brockie, Nickolaus Lewis and Councilmen Henry Cagey. Hyshqe' to all the former council members who previously served on Council. I am truly honored and blessed to be selected once more by the 90<sup>th</sup> LIBC to serve as Chairman.

In addition to the tribal elections we are appreciative for our community's involvement in the local

elections. We had nearly 500 voters submit their ballots at the LIBC ballot drop off box. Hyshqe to the LIBC staff that helped promote the Native Vote efforts; our relationship with the other local governing bodies is vital to the growth of our community. We congratulate those who have been recently elected to the neighboring municipalities and we look forward to working with our neighbors to improve our community.

During the first week of November President Obama hosted the 7<sup>th</sup> annual White House Native Nations Conference. The Obama administration met with all Tribal Nations and held a series of meetings that covered sacred sites, land restoration, education, economic development and other trust responsibility issues. During the conference the Lummi delegation rallied alongside other tribes who come from the coast of the Salish Sea, and gathered at the White House for a Tribal Nation Conference to urge Congress to uphold treaty rights and to protect the sacred sites at Xwe'chi'eXen (Cherry Point). Hyshqe' to the

Tulalip Tribal Chairman Mel Sheldon, Lower Elwha Klallam Tribal Chairwoman Frances Charles, Yakama Chairman JoDe Goudy, Spokane Tribal Vice-Chair David Browneagle, Hoopa Tribal Chairman Ryan Jackson, Sauk Suiattle Vice Chairman Kevin Lenon, Vice President Tyson Johnston and Nooksack councilwoman Lona Johnson for standing with us to preserve and protect Xwe'chi'eXen. Tribal treaty rights are being threatened by corporate interest and congressional interference. We are not alone in fighting the pressures of development and we are committed to promoting development that recognizes our past and fits the future of which our way of life requires; we stand united with our allied tribes.

The congressional threat to our treaty rights still lingers. We will be traveling back to Washington DC with our allied tribes the first week of December to deliver the message that we expect our trust relationship to be honored. When in DC I plan to continue the discussion with USDA and our home

delegation to create the short term and long term solutions to Portage Bay shellfish closure.

The 90<sup>th</sup> council convened this past month and approved of the following funding priorities for 2016, all of equal priority and importance:

**Policy Priorities:**

- Protection of Sovereignty and Treaty Rights
- A Judicial System that Respects & Serves the Community
- Protecting & Keeping the Children Safe
- Financial Plan/Restructure
- I-5 Property Project

**Administration Priorities:**

- A Judicial System that Respects & Serves the Community
- Protecting & Keeping the Children Safe
- Che Shesh Whe Wheleq Initiative
- Financial Plan/Restructure

LIBC acknowledges that there are overlapping

priorities between policy and administration and believe working together on these priorities will produce an outcome that best serves the people of the Lummi Nation.

On November 20, 2015 the SRC opened its new hotel tower, and the grand opening is a good sign of our growing economy; we will continue to promote further development of our tribal workforce. We were honored to be joined by other Tribal Leaders and local elected officials during the opening.

In closing, I would like to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of all LIBC employees. We are committed to Preserving, Promoting and protecting our Sche'lang'en and working together as one mind and one spirit.

As always our doors are open and we encourage any and all tribal members to visit with their concerns and recommendations.

The Office of the Treasurer has been focusing on the importance of stabilizing the financial future of the LIBC. Title 28 is the main focal point of the financial protocol of LIBC. It is a goal of this office to remind those who have been here and inform those who are new to LIBC the importance of compliance with Title 28. Title 28 explains expenses that are allowable and those that aren't; it explains the roles and responsibilities of the Office of the Treasurer, the Budget Committee and the Fiduciary responsibility of the Tribal Council as well as those with delegation of authority over any budgets. Both the Budget Committee and the Council met on several occasions to review the comments from the community and, taking the comments seriously, kept them in mind as we moved forward to finalize a draft budget. At the regular council meeting held on December 1<sup>st</sup> the council approved the draft budget and the Office of the Treasurer moved forward with the third public hearing which was hosted

We here in the Office of the Treasurer have been working very diligently alongside the CFO, the budget committee, the tribal council and other staff at coming to a balanced draft budget and we are pleased to announce that the draft budget was approved by budget committee on November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2015 and then by the tribal council on December 1<sup>st</sup>. Moving along with the process we held the third Title 28 public hearing on December 1<sup>st</sup> as well. The comments from the community are being taken into further consideration as the Final

budget for 2016 is being formulated. Our goal is to have the final budget be approved by LIBC at the next regular meeting scheduled for December 15<sup>th</sup>. The draft budget for 2016 is now available to all general council members. Per Title 28 (28.07.030) "The Treasurer shall have the approved Draft Budget published and made available for review by the Lummi community within seven (7) days of its approval by the LIBC"

We also have the Treasurer's Report available to General Council members in council operations; this report shows budgetary information of LIBC through the end of October of 2015. # Natural Resources Department

## Water Resources Division

The Water Resources Division staff continued the surface and ground water ambient water quality monitoring activities on the Reservation, reviewed storm water pollution prevention plans and conducted associated inspections for several tribal development projects, conducted site visits to evaluate proposed projects as part of the Lummi land use permit process, and continued the development and maintenance of several databases.

On November 2, 2015, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) approved the Lummi Nation Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan: 2015 Update as a Tribal Mitigation Plan, in accordance with federal regulations. The MHMP was originally adopted by the LIBC in 2004 and later updated in 2007 and 2010. The purpose of the MHMP is to guide current and future efforts to effectively and efficiently mitigate the impacts of natural hazards on the Reservation, as well as to guide efforts to mitigate and respond to natural hazards that are generated off-Reservation or that cross Reservation boundaries in coordination with other agencies as appropriate. By developing, reviewing, and updating a Tribal Mitigation Plan, the Lummi Nation maintains eligibility to apply directly to FEMA as a grantee for Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (Stafford Act) non-emergency programs (e.g., Hazard Mitigation Grant Program, Pre-Disaster Mitigation grants).

On November 4-5, 2015 the Lummi Fisheries and Natural Resources Commission Chairman (Elden Hillaire) and four Lummi Natural Resources Department staff members participated in the worst case discharge tabletop exercise hosted by BP Shipping and Alaska Tanker Company at the Whatcom Unified Emergency Coordination Center near Bellingham International Airport. Elden Hillaire served as the Tribal On-Scene Coordinator (TOSC) in the Unified Command (see picture), with Jeremy Freimund as

his Deputy TOSC. Jamie Mattson, Hanna Winter, and Lisa Cook participated in the Planning Section – Environmental Unit.

On November 10, 2015, division staff members hosted the annual meeting of the Lummi Nation Wetland and Habitat Mitigation Bank Interagency Review Team (IRT). The IRT meeting included participants from the Corps of Engineers, EPA, and the Department of Ecology and included a site visit to the Nooksack Delta site.

On November 13, 2015, division staff attended a Community Coordination meeting hosted by



FEMA to discuss the recent updates to the Flood Insurance Study (FIS) and Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs) for the Reservation. The FIRMs delineate the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), which is the area subject in inundation during the 1 percent annual chance flood event (a.k.a., 100-year flood event), and provide additional information regarding anticipated flood elevations, flood depths, and/or other associated hazards (e.g., coastal flood zones with velocity hazards). The FIRMs are an integral part of the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and, in conjunction with Elevation Certificates (ECs), are used to determine the risk of flooding and the cost of flood insurance for specific structures. A public outreach meeting to discuss how the FIS and FIRM updates may affect community members will be held in January or February.

## Forestry Division Beachwood Cutting Permits

Lummi tribal members planning to harvest driftwood on tribal tidelands of the Lummi Reservation must have a Beachwood

Cutting Permit approved by the Lummi Natural Resources Department's Forestry Division. Contact Tom Branson, Forest Manager at (360)312-2325 for more information. Beachwood Cutting Permits must accompany the Permittee while cutting wood. No cutting will be allowed on Portage Island or along any islands or shoreline of the Nooksack River.

All driftwood and logs not clearly identifiable as being owned by another party are allowed. No standing live or dead trees shall be cut down for firewood.

All beachwood is for personal use only and not to be sold.

Any violations of this permit could result in a fine of \$50.00 to \$500.00 and loss of all firewood permit privileges (Lummi Code of Laws 10.18.050).

## Geographic Information Systems (GIS) Division

The Lummi GIS Division has been working with the Lummi Planning Department to map the locations of automobile accidents on the Lummi Indian Reservation. This month's Map of the Month shows all reported traffic accidents on the Reservation between January 2009 and January 2015, so long as the location (i.e., latitude and longitude) of the accident was provided in the report. There were a total of 134 traffic accidents recorded over this time period. These accidents were mapped based on the primary cause of the accident, but most accidents involve a combination of factors. Of the 134 accidents, 20 accidents were primarily caused by the vehicle operator driving too fast for conditions and 29 were primarily caused by drivers impaired by alcohol or drugs. The remaining 85 accidents were a result of various human errors including driving over the center line, ill or sleeping drivers, driver distractions, tailgating, and failing to yield. This map includes both native and non-native drivers.

Did you know?

The Tribal Traffic Safety Advisory Board estimates that 40 percent

of all traffic accidents involve drivers exceeding the speed limit.

More than 50 percent of speeding traffic deaths occur on rural roads.

Almost 70 percent of speeding-involved deaths occur between 3 pm and 3 am.

In speeding-involved fatalities, impairment is a factor 64 percent of the time.

Speeding increases the likelihood and severity of a crash.

Please remember: The easiest way to prevent harm to yourself and your family is to drive sober, drive slow, and WEAR YOUR SEAT-BELT at all times.

## Stock Assessment Division

### Longfin Smelt

The Stock Assessment and Harvest Management Division field staff interviewed and sampled the "Hooligan" catches of several fishers this past week.

The "Hooligan" that returns to the lower Nooksack to spawn is the longfin smelt, *Spirinchus thaleichthys*. According to local fishers, the run starts around Veterans Day and ends about Thanksgiving weekend. Most fishers catch these smelt with a "pole net" as the fish move upstream to spawn. The net is typically rigid, made from 1/4" square wire mesh with about a 24" round opening, and attached to a 10' long pole. Various net shapes and styles were seen: round, oval, and square openings; 1-3' diameter; net shape cylindrical or cone shaped.

During the sampling period there were approximately 10 to 20 folks fishing above the Marietta Bridge on the east side, the most popular fishing area. Other sites where smelt fishing was seen include areas below Marietta Bridge (both banks) and Fish Point.

Average catch observed for the dates we sampled (11/11/15 – 11/13/15) was about 1/4 of a 5-gallon bucket which is approximately 10 pounds or about 280 fish. For the non-treaty fishers, this is the daily limit. The sex ratio of the

fish sampled during this period varied from 10% to 33% females. Anecdotal information indicates that males seem to arrive ahead of females.

Length of fish sampled averaged 119 millimeters (mm) for the females and 127 mm for the males. Lengths ranged from 103 mm to 142 mm.

According to research published by the Fisheries Research Board of Canada, longfin smelt are typically anadromous but are landlocked in Harrison Lake, B.C. and in Lake Washington (Hart 1973). The population ranges from San Francisco Bay, California to Prince William Sound, Alaska. Spawning takes place in the second year of age from October to December in streams near the sea. In Lake Washington, the females sampled had an average of 18,100 eggs. Fish die soon after spawning with possibly a few females surviving.

The eggs are adhesive, about 1.2 mm in diameter and hatch in about 40 days at a temperature of 44°F. Newly hatched larvae are about 7mm long. The location of spawning in the Nooksack River is unknown, but thought to be on the sandy bottom of the river between the Slater and Marietta Road bridges.

Even less is known about the saltwater life-history of the longfin smelt. Some have been caught in shrimp trawls during the winter down to about 75 fathoms.

If anyone has any local knowledge of these fish you would like to share, please contact Don Kruse, Stock Assessment Division at 312-2306. Of particular interest are observations during spawning, run timing, upriver extent, and relative abundance over time.

## Nooksack Chum

In 2011, a joint program between Washington State Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) and the Lummi Natural Resources Department (LNR) to provide native Nooksack chum broodstock for the WDFW Kendall Hatchery was resumed a decade after the program was discontinued. This program aims to provide more fish for treaty fishers as well as buffer a portion of the

chum run from high flows that could severely reduce chum abundance. This is the fifth season LNR will gather ripe chum by beach seine from spawning areas of the North Fork Nooksack River. Eggs are taken on site and fertilized at the hatchery. The last few years we started in mid-November, but due to the high river flows this year, the first day of brood collection will be no earlier than November 24<sup>th</sup>. In 2014, LNR collected a quarter million eggs on the spawning grounds, while the remainder of the 1.1 million egg total was collected at the Kendall Hatchery from chum returning from the 2011 broodyear release. This was the first year we met our egg take goal of 1 million. The goal for this year remains the same: a total release of 1 million chum fry. All chum will be released from Kendall in April and May.

This year we will collect brood only until adult spawners show up at the Kendall Hatchery in early December. This is to minimize impacts to wild spawning fish. 2015 may be the last year to gather

brood off the spawning grounds because after this the run should be self-sustaining.

Harvest Management Division

### Salmon

For the second year in a row, the tribes harvested their full share of Fraser chum, with Lummi catching about 46,000 fish. Chum fisheries in the Nooksack River have also fared well, with good catches through the first two weeks of November. The steelhead fishing season begins on December 15 and is scheduled to be open 3 days/week. Steelhead fishing permits will be available from the LNR office starting December 14.

### Crab

The October crab fishery was held from October 1-9, with Lummi harvesting approximately 356,000 pounds, valued at \$1.3 million. The winter crab fishery began on October 29, with a price of \$4/lb. The price has climbed steadily and by mid-November had topped \$6/lb. The fishery will remain

open through early spring, targeting approximately 650,000 pounds.

### Clams and Oysters

The commercial harvest of manila clams began on November 13 in Lummi Bay. Additional openings will be held throughout the winter and into the spring, during minus tides. The inter-tidal area along Lummi Shore Road is currently closed to all inter-tidal harvest and will re-open January 1 (there are maps of the closure area available in the LNR office).

### Commercial Diving Harvests

The 2015-16 sea cucumber season began August 1 with a District 1 quota of 267,000 pounds. Lummi divers are currently fishing 3 days per week in District 1 and 2. Although harvest reports for November are incomplete, at the time of publication, Lummi divers have harvested about 130,000 pounds of cucumbers valued at almost \$625,000. Lummi's 2-year share of geoduck from Alden Bank is 13,000 pounds. Over the summer, LNR staff completed geoduck

surveys for Pt. Thompson and Foulweather Bluff.

### Timber, Fish, & Wildlife – Forests & Fish Rules (TFW-FFR) Division

It's mid-fall and the storms of November are making themselves apparent, and with that in mind, we want to take a moment to remind everyone, especially hunters, gatherers and anyone else out in the woods to be extra careful out there. These fall windstorms are especially good at bringing down branches and even whole trees! So as a safety reminder, remember if you're planning a trip to the forest to take your warm winter clothing, raingear, and maybe a rope, saw, or come-along with you.



This past summer the TFW-FFR Division collaborated with the Restoration Division in the construction of new logjams in the Larson's Bridge reach of the upper South Fork Nooksack River. This is the same reach where the Natural Resources Department first constructed

logjams for managing the input of sediment and restoration of natural channel processes that form and maintain critical salmon habitat. These premier logjams are an unqualified success and demonstrate the validity of restoring natural features to restore natural processes. We are confident that the department's latest work will prove equally successful and look forward to demonstrating their effectiveness in the coming years.

Division staff members continued to work with the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR), the US Forest Service (USFS), and private landowners for the continued protection of Lummi treaty-reserved resources, especially for the protection of salmon and their freshwater habitats throughout the Nooksack River watershed.





Call 360-380-6656 to speak with a patient care coordinator

The Lummi Tribal Health Center is excited to announce that we will be offering same-day appointments starting October 19<sup>th</sup>, 2015. We are hoping this will decrease wait times and improve timely access to care. Starting October 19<sup>th</sup>, we are asking patients to call the clinic on the day they would like to be seen and we will work to get you a time to be seen that day. In the last 3 months we have hired two new physicians and made some adjustments to the schedule, which will more than triple the number of available appointments each day.

Here's how it will work:

- If you would like to be seen by a provider, call 360-380-6656 and speak to a patient care coordinator who will find you an available appointment time.
- When you have your appointment time, we ask you to arrive 15 minutes early to allow time to fill out your paperwork and get checked in.
- If we get you checked in on time, you will have a 30 minute appointment with a provider who will be able to take care of your immediate needs and have time to review your medication list and make sure you're up to date on preventative health measures.
- We will still be able to see walk-in patients but these patients may have a longer wait as we try to see scheduled patients during their scheduled appointment time.

We realize this will be a change, but we feel it will be a change for the better.





## HOUSING AUTHORITY SEEKING CANDIDATES FOR TRIBAL HOMEOWNERSHIP

Buildable Lots Currently Available

Would you like to own your own home? Do you own your own land? Would you be interested in Tribal sub-leasing? The Lummi Nation Housing Authority (LNHA) is currently seeking candidates who are considered "over-income" according to statewide Low-Income limits that are used by HUD to determine eligibility for housing

assistance. Even if you are over-income, you may still qualify for various kinds of assistance leading eventually to homeownership.

LNHA currently has fully-serviced build-ready lots in the Mackenzie, Sandy Point and Sche'lang'en Village (corner of Kwina and Haxton) neighborhoods available for new home construction. The Housing Authority may construct homes for qualifying tribal members based

on models recently constructed, or they may wish to construct architecturally compatible homes of their own. There are a variety of options that can be considered.

Homeownership Candidates must have at least two (2) years of steady, verifiable income and have good credit, or be willing to work on building or rebuilding credit. Once the application is complete and screened, it will be

added to a list for potential homeownership--- **ONLY** if your family meets all the required homeownership criteria.

## Records & Archives

**Mission Statement:** To serve the Lummi Nation by preserving and protecting the historical and business records of the Tribe, and to provide records management services to LIBC and Tribal Community.

We continue to receive records accessions with no room to put them. We have started moving records back to the old building to be able to continue to accept accessions. If we could get all disposals signed off on (Education, Housing, and Water & Sewer) that were sent out we would be able to purge a lot of the old records and either scan or archive so it would open up space in the records stacks. We were also able to begin disposal process for 135 boxes approved for disposal. Of these 135 boxes, we have completed 15 boxes this month with 406 documents saved for archiving or scanning. As the end of the year approached we will have to put the disposal aside to prepare for next year. With the loss of the scanners from budget cut-backs the scanning project has slowed down and we are only able to work on scanning when we have free time. We will keep moving forward though just at a slower pace.






So, the year is winding down and the weather is starting to act accordingly. The winds are stronger, the air is colder, and the rain is beginning to pelt us as we huddle around the fire. Still the stories continue.

I have another one, also involving a car that's gone missing...somewhere.

The death of James Dean, an iconic actor whose premature end was written in a crash at an intersection of two California highways that doesn't even exist anymore, has spawned way more stories and conspiracy theories than it really deserves. First there was the investigation into the crash, then there was the series of stories about where the pieces of the car migrated off to, and finally there was the legend of the "James Dean's car curse". Well, that oughta' be spooky enough for a campfire story, right?

I hadn't worried about any of this for years because, for the most part, I have a life. I did run across a news story about a week back that, though, that got me interested in this whole goofy mess again. George Barris, the king of car customizers back in the '60s, '70s, and '80's, died a while back and on November 13, Fox News ran a story on the controversy over the ownership of the remains of the Porsche 550 Carrera that Dean was driving when

he was killed. It seems that Barris had laid claim to the car. So the story goes, after the estate was settled and the insurance company holding the policy on Dean's car had paid Dean's beneficiaries for the car as well as turning the remains of the wrecked car to the family. Fox's story has the car being sold to a Dr. William Eschrich who removed the engine and drivetrain and used it for a racecar he was building before, as it says in the article, "...Barris took possession of the rest of the car...."

The kicker is that no paperwork appears to exist to document that transaction.

At this point, I got curious and turned to a source of info that I've repeatedly mentioned that I rely on a lot when writing these columns - Wikipedia.

Evidently, when Dean moved from the east coast of the US to go work in movies, he began earning tons of money. He also made a ton of new friends who were into the California sports car racing scene. Unlike drag racing, which was also attracting a lot of attention in California, sports car racing involved sustained running of the cars at speed on a variety of twisty courses that ranged from purpose-built road circuits to abandoned airfields.

Although new to the sport, Dean did show promise and native talent.

His background in cars at the time seems to have included an MG TD which may have whetted his appetite for light, quick, and maneuverable machinery. On trading the MG for a new Porsche Speedster, he sort of upped his game a bit. The MG was light and maneuverable, didn't develop a lot of horsepower. The Speedster was also light and maneuverable, but with a more powerful engine and a rear-engine rear-wheel-drive setup as opposed to the MG's front-engine rear-wheel-drive arrangement. They handled quite differently. The few races that he entered with the Speedster began to show encouraging results. He was actually placing very high in the races that he'd entered. There are some who say that if he'd spent more time racing the Speedster and building racing experience, he might've lived to a ripe old age. I don't know.

There are stories that say the car that Dean replaced the Speedster with - a Porsche 550 Carrera -- had a sinister look about it. Supposedly, the actor, Sir Alec Guinness warned him to stay out of the car. Personally, I don't think the 550 was as dangerous as a lot of people made it out to be. Back in the '70s I actually got to see one at an autocross in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Yes, it was light, it had a Porsche 911 six-cylinder engine mounted in the middle of the car, and driver protection in the cockpit was rudimentary at best. But, I also got to see it perform on the autocross track, and it displayed none of the tricky, vicious behavior that some ascribe to it. I

figure that Dean may have embarrassed himself on the racecourse, but I don't think he would've killed himself in it.

Besides, Dean didn't die in the 550 in a racing accident. Dean died in the 550 in a traffic accident. He was driving the car to a race when he collided with a 1950 Ford sedan that was turning onto the highway (then known as Route 466). The details are laid out in the Wikipedia article as well in Warren Beath's book, "The Death of James Dean". The Wikipedia article also details the events following the funeral, the disposition of the estate, and the circumstances surrounding question of Bariss's owner-

ship of the engine-less hulk of Dean's 550.

The Fox news story is focusing on who now owns the hulk, which Barris claimed disappeared years ago. Fox's story talks about a man who may have an idea where the car may be hidden - a false wall in a barn in Washington State. In the article, it's stated that the Volo Auto Museum in Illinois has a bounty out on the car and may be close to locating it. At any rate, in the condition that it's probably in now, it won't be able to...keep it between the ditches and the shiny (?) side up.

### Veterans Day

Wednesday, November 11th, honoring those who served. It reminds us that freedom isn't free. Veterans Day is celebrating and honoring every soldier, sailor, airman past or present, living or dead, for his or her service in the U.S. Military. In 1919, President Wilson designated November 11th as Armistice Day to commemorate the end of World War I which ended on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month. In 1954 President Eisenhower changed the name to Veteran's Day.

### PTSD Veterans

Combat veterans are high risk for mental health issues. The atrocities of war; exposure to wounded, dead or dying comrades, wounding or killing the enemy. They cannot forget the horrors of combat. Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) is caused from what they saw and experienced. Before the Vietnam war, it was commonly referred to as "shell shock." Twenty-three veterans take their own lives everyday. That's a suicide every 65 minutes. According to the Veteran's Administration, (VA) over 150,000 Vietnam Veterans committed suicide. They killed themselves because the country they fought so hard for did nothing to help them or the deniability of medical assistance by the VA. Our veterans returning from the war zone, may seek comfort in talking to their grandparents. If you are

### Notable Days

Native American Day is replacing Columbus Day, a day that honors a man who stands for oppression, cruelty, slavery, murder, rape, mass extermination and stealing lands from indigeneous people by Europeans. The annihilation of the Americas and the eradication of the aboriginal people through disease, war, massacre, and forced assimilation. Native Nations celebrated Indigenous People's Day with powwows, drumming, singing, dancing, bringing back our rich history and culture. The state of Washington does not celebrate Columbus Day. The city of Bellingham honors it as Coast Salish Day. Lummi celebrated Lhaq'temish Skweyel "Our Way of Life Day" with dinner, door prizes, children dancing, stories, history and lots of levity. Ernestine Gensaw spoke of ladies from our rich culture from cannery workers to weavers at Barber's.

1972: Master carver, Morrie Alexander 1915-1973, an Artist in Residence at the Washington State Cultural Enrichment Program and Curator of the Whatcom County Museum.

1996: Gov. Gary Locke honored Lummi tribal elder Pauline Hillaire with the Governor's Heritage Award.

1941: The Naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii territory, was attacked in the early morning hours of December 7th killing more than 2300 Americans. According to the Library of Congress, the U.S.S. Arizona was completely destroyed and the U.S.S. Oklahoma capsized. A total of twelve ships sank or were beached in the attack and nine additional vessels were damaged. More than 160 aircraft were destroyed and more than 150 others damaged.

Dec 25th Christmas: A Christian holiday celebrating the birth of Christ. Many attend church services. To children it's a time of excitement as they await the arrival of Santa Claus. Families and friends get together breaking bread enjoying the bountiful of the season and exchanging gifts. As you sit down at

the table, eat in moderation, take smaller portions, watch the carbs, sugars and sodium. After your meal, go for a walk. Exercise, move around. Don't sit on dead calories and always check your blood sugar. Take extra precautions to avoid Christmas tree fires. Always check light strings before placing on the tree. Keep tree away from any heat source. Be diligent about watering your tree and never leave it unattended.

### Great Grandparents

Many grandparents, age 55 and older, are raising their grandchildren and great grandchildren without the help of the natural parents. You raised your family but find yourself raising your grandchildren. When grandparents become the full-time parent, it might be the parent passed or is away in the military. It could be the child was having problems with his/her social structure. Sadly, alcohol and drug abuse, neglect or maybe the parents are incarcerated or incapable of caring for their children. It is not uncommon for grandparents to step up and raise a second or third family. Hy'shqe to all the families who are Grandparenting. \o/

### Commods Canning

### Diabetes and Alcoholism

Native Americans have the highest incidence of Type II Diabetes and the highest incidence of alcoholism, smoking and suicide. We are vulnerable to adult-onset diabetes when associated with drinking. Alcoholism, like diabetes, is a physical disease. Alcohol intake significantly increases the risk of hypoglycemia. Don't be a couch potato, get up and exercise, it's good for your overall health. Drink responsibly and always check your blood sugar.

### Vaccines

Make sure your vacci-

nations are up to date. Protecting yourself is a life long responsibility that doesn't end with baby shots. The flu is the deadliest for those age 65 and older. We are more likely to get pneumonia so it is advisable to get the pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (PPSV), providing a protective effect against the 23 most common strains of pneumonia-causing bacteria. Us older folks may need additional vaccinations. The Center for Disease Control (CDC) advises Hepatitis A and B. Talk to your health care professional about vaccinations you may need. Call Lummi Tribal Health Center at (360) 312-2492 making sure your vaccines are current.

### Activities

The Health Commission adopted a revised travel policy regarding the age of travelers. You must be 62 to travel out of the immediate vicinity. However, for ages 55 on up, this does not apply for local shopping, food bank or activities at Wexliem.

LBC Hosted a luncheon for visitors from Xwsenč Pauquachin First Nations, West Saanich, Victoria, BC. It was fun drumming, singing and telling stories of the glory days. There was plenty of talk about stick game bragging rights and, of course, canoe racing. It was music to hear the sounds of laughter as they enjoyed a playful afternoon. Thank you Marcel Hillaire and culinary staff; Brian James, Latoya Ballew and Ron Noland, Jr. for the delectable seafood meal.

An LBC tenant meeting was held to discuss security and safety issues at the retirement facility. Surveillance video cameras continuously monitor the grounds, parking and common areas while Lummi Law and Order randomly patrols. All visitors are required to sign in and out at front desk. 




