



LYA First Month of School

So far, we are off to a great start to the 2015-16 school year. We have officially hired a second member to our Academic Team in support of our efforts to keep our residents in school consistently and maintaining above average GPAs. Monday through Thursday, our residents participate in study hall from 3:30-5:30 including a half hour of reading time. We also offer late night study hall Monday through Thursday from 6:00-8:00 pm to accommodate our many athletes and their varying schedules. Currently, one of our study hall incentives includes receiving a movie ticket for each book read and a one-page summary completed outside of school. Our expectations are to go above and beyond the high school curriculum.

We have two residents working on their GEDs through the IMPACT program at Bellingham Technical College and one high school student registered for part time classes at NWIC through Running Start.

We encourage extracurricular activities as well as igniting a passion for lifelong learning. Seven of our residents are participating in sports at either Ferndale High School or Lummi Nation School. One is participating in a cheer-leading club in Bellingham.

Let's continue to cheer on our youth this fall as they participate in extracurricular activities including cheer leading, cross country, and football. As always, we invite any and all family and community members to visit us for din-

ner starting at 5:30pm daily.

FROM THE LYA MEDICAL OFFICE: As we look to the new school year in the Lummi Youth Academy Medical Office, I am proud to say as the Community Medicine RN that our LYA Team has worked diligently to provide an atmosphere that supports school attendance by decreasing factors that could lead to chronic absenteeism. Common factors that contribute to missed days at school are poor mental health, lack of food, shelter and clothing; as well as frequent health problems. At the academy our youth are able to advance in student success as they are provided the protective factors of stable housing, a sheltered, safe environment, supportive staff, and safe, nutritious

meals. Our youth are offered counseling, education, clinical intervention, and long lasting protective interventions.

Preventing barriers to success is important to the academy and consistent health problems can definitely cause missed days of school. In the medical office we have prepared throughout the summer to address annual physicals, immunizations, chronic health issues, oral health, insurance needs, medication management, staff training and much, much more. From August 1st to September 21st there were 50 appointments scheduled with staff transportation; 9 youth have or are receiving a new smile as we transport them monthly to Mill Creek Orthodontics! Way to go LYA Medical Of-

fice Team!

Word on the street had it that while you could get a full warranty on, say, a Plymouth Road Runner with a 440 c.i. "Wedge" engine, no warranty was offered on the same car with the 426 Hemi. At that time, the 426 was marketed solely as a performance engine. Word on the street also said that it was offered with solid valve lifters from the factory since hydraulic lifters were known to rob engines of a small amount of power. This left Hemi owners with the prospect of periodically having to get the valves adjusted as part of a tune up. In Lafayette, Louisiana, we saw more of the 426-powered cars in the pages of car magazines than on the streets, even though Lafayette, with all

of the oil money floating around, was a magnet for exotic machinery.

As I got older, I became dimly aware that there were precursors to the 426. Friends mentioned that drag racers preferred using the older 392 c.i. versions of the Hemi engine because of their durability on the track. This was borne out to me by an article I read in "Car and Driver" that mentioned a performance parts specialty shop in California was producing aluminum-block versions of the 392, since the dwindling supply of the real thing now made the aluminum-block engine a cheaper (and lighter) option.

There were other articles that hinted at the existence of Hemis being campaigned in road racing in the early 1950s by race team owner Briggs Cunningham. Evidently, Cunningham had attracted Chrysler's attention after he'd successfully run a team of three Cadillacs (Yes, I know.) at LeMans. They wound up handing him financial and technical support to produce cars under his own name and using Chrysler running gear to run not only at LeMans, but in a series of European and American road races as well.

The most famous outing of the Hemis in

racing was when Petty Enterprises used them in the number 43 cars in NASCAR racing, the most outrageous being the shark-nosed Plymouth "Superbirds". For years in NASCAR racing, practically any Chrysler car competing in Nascar racing displayed "426 C.I." somewhere on the bodywork.

So, I figured I had a pretty good lock on the Hemi's ancient history. Well, I didn't. As a matter of fact, I was damn near flattened by the amount of information about cars that were driving around when I was a kid.

The first surprise was that Chrysler was involved in developing an engine for the Republic P-47 fighter aircraft during WWII. It was a 16-cylinder V-type engine with 2220 cubic inch displacement. It featured hemispherical combustion chambers to squeeze more power from an already enormous engine.

Wikipedia puts the first use in production cars of Hemi engines in Chrysler's 1951 model year cars. Mostly they were of 331 c.i. displacement and were rated at 180 horsepower. If you are ever at an antique car show and looking in the engine bay of one of

these ancient behemoths, and notice the words "Fire Power" on the valve covers ("Fire Dome" if it's a DeSoto), you're looking at a Hemi.

Here's the list of all of the variations of the old Hemi that Wikipedia gives:

-Chrysler; 331 c.i., 354 c.i., 392 c.i. (Remember that one?)

-DeSoto; 276 c.i., 291 c.i., 330 c.i., 341 c.i., 345 c.i.

-Dodge; 241 c.i. (Red Ram), 270 c.i., 315 c.i., 325 c.i.

Wikipedia has the appearance of the 426 c.i. Hemi as being in 1964. It started out being offered to racing organization only until problems with homologation rules (They needed to offered in production cars.) forced Chrysler to market them to the buying public. These were in the showrooms from 1965 to 1971.

The site also lists the variations of the new generation of Hemis. It makes for fascinating reading, but these new engines seem to lack some of the magic and romance of the older thumpers. Maybe they need a few more years of keeping it between the ditches and the shiny side up.


