## Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and Washington state tribes gather to oppose Dakota Access Pipeline

### Tribes ask that sovereign rights be honored

August 30, 2016

CANNON BALL, North Dakota—The Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and eight Washington state tribes gathered along the banks of the Cannonball River to oppose the Dakota Access Pipeline, which would run through Standing Rock’s ancestral homelands. The tribes urged the United States District Court to rule in favor of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe’s request to issue an injunction that stops construction of the pipeline until the Tribe’s waters and cultural resources are protected.

The eight Washington



state tribes included the Lower Elwha Klallam Tribe and Hoh Tribe, many of whom have faced similar challenges to their lands and ways of life. Some of the tribes that attended the event

have won recent battles against proposed oil and coal export terminals that would have violated treaty rights, endangered fish and shellfish, and threatened the tribes’ very existence.

“We’ve seen the success our

friends from Washington state have had in their battles to protect treaty rights against the transport of fos-

## Ranking Member Grijalva Traveling to North Dakota This Weekend in Solidarity With Standing Rock Sioux Against DAPL Pipeline

Washington, D.C. – Natural Resources Committee Ranking Member Raúl M. Grijalva (D-Ariz.) will travel to North Dakota this Sunday, Sept. 11, in solidarity with the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe against construction of the Dakota Access pipeline (DAPL), a 1,100-mile pipeline that would stretch from North Dakota to a river port in Illinois.

Grijalva’s trip comes in the wake of today’s joint announcement by the Department of the Army, the Department of Justice and the Department of the Interior that construction of the pipeline would cease on Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE)

land bordering or under Lake Oahe, which has seen growing protests in recent weeks, pending a full review of the Corps’ legal responsibilities at the site. The departments called on the pipeline construction company voluntarily to pause construction within 20 miles east or west of Lake Oahe until the review is complete.

The departments further pledged to initiate full government-to-government consultation “this fall” with tribes to discuss possible reforms of the consultation process moving forward.

The announcement is a significant reversal of the DAPL construction process to date. Despite the federal government’s legal trust re-

sponsibility to ensure federally permitted projects do not threaten historically or culturally significant tribal places, the trust lands of tribal nations, or the waters that run through them, the Standing Rock Sioux were never consulted about the DAPL, which will run less than a mile from their reservation.

Sacred and culturally significant places have already been impacted by construction and may have been destroyed. Just as seriously, the DAPL is a spill risk for the Missouri River – the Standing Rock Sioux’s only water source. By failing to consult the tribe formally during the permitting process and

**Senators’ Bill Continues to Gain Momentum after Unanimously Passing in Senate Last Year, and in U.S. House of Representatives Committee in July**

WASHINGTON, D.C.

– U.S. Senators Heidi Heitkamp (D-ND) and Lisa Murkowski (R-AK) today announced that their bipartisan bill to improve the lives of Native American children unanimously passed in the U.S. House of Representatives – bringing their legislation one step closer to reaching the president’s desk for his signature. Their bill passed in the U.S. Senate last year.

In July, Heitkamp and Murkowski’s bill unanimously passed in the U.S. House Committee on Natural Resources. The vote followed Heitkamp’s testimony

As we begin the 2016-17 school year, I anticipate that the Lummi children had an amazing summer. It was a pleasure for me to see all the youth working in the Lummi Administration Building throughout July and August. Our youth are the future leaders of the Lummi Nation, if you know of anyone that was working this summer, please thank them. These youth were able to learn and gain the experience of working for a tribal government, and because of that, we can continue to build our workforce.

The month of August began with Lummi hosting the Council for Tribal Employment Rights (CTER)

hosting the 39th Annual 2016 National Tribal Employment Rights Ordinance/Office (TERO) Convention at the Silver Reef Hotel Casino & Spa. The purpose of this Convention was to discuss: sovereignty, governance, leadership, encompassing jobs, training, and career opportunities for tribes across the Nation. I was privileged to give the official welcoming on August 1, 2016. I was even more honored to help prepare the BBQ fish for our guests and their welcoming dinner that same day. I hope that we (as tribes) can continue to work and increase job opportunities for tribal members throughout the nation.

The LIBC held two regular meeting on August 2, 2016 and August 16, 2016. The LIBC utilizes these meetings to establish the policy direction needed to preserve, promote, and protect our Schelangen. As a result of this work, we can make certain that the needs of our people are being met to the best of our ability. Thank you elected officials for taking this time to dis-

cuss, contribute, and work together as a team for the betterment of our people.

Back in May 2016 the United States (U.S.) Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) rendered their decision to prohibit the Gateway Pacific Terminal (GPT). This is a historic event because it was one of the rare moments that the Tribe exerted its Treaty Right Claim and the trustee responded regardless of the extreme political and cooperate pressures placed on the Federal government. It was a true example of the Treaty being honored. In response to our invite to the Corps to our annual First Salmon Ceremony the national headquarters invited Councilman Julius and I to the 158th Castle Ball on August 5th, 2016. We were humbled to find out that we were the first Native tribal officials to attend their annual celebration.

On August 12, 2016 we had the great honor of witnessing Mae Moss celebrate her 100th birthday. Mae is the daughter of Lucy Gates and Lee Mackenzie. We wish her nothing but

happiness, good health, and many blessings this upcoming year. Thank you for allowing the LIBC to host your birthday and giving us a reason to celebrate.

In conjunction with the birthday celebration, the Lummi Nation hosted staff people who work for the House of Representative Susan DelBene. The staff employees for Representative DelBene met with fellow Council members and were given a tour of the Administration Center, the Chemical Addiction Recovery and Education (CARE) Office, and the Lummi Aquaculture. The

purpose of this visit was to express our concerns that we are facing. Our goal, of the Lummi Nation, is to collaborate with state and federal governments to secure access to resources to improve the health and wellness of our people. We hope to continue this work in the coming months.

As always, our doors are open and we encourage any and all tribal members to visit with their concerns and recommendations.



As you may recall, much of this work with Lummi Peacemaking Circles was initiated in 2008 through the Lummi CEDAR Project, and was carried on as a partnership with the Lummi Indian Business Council when listening sessions were taking place with elders and community (2013-14), as a part of the Schelangen work group initiative. Today, it continues to thrive as a community partnership with LIBC, Lummi CEDAR Project, Northwest Indian College, PointOneNorth, TiChee, Whatcom Community College, and the Mangrove Collective. Lummi Peacemaking Circle encourages deep listening and values-based action, healthy communication and trust and

relationship building. The Mission of this work is to honor the Creator, the Ancient Ones, and Ourselves, and the Vision is a Lummi Nation living together in Peace, Love and Harmony.

People who can benefit from Peacemaking Circles include: Community organizers, elected leaders, youth serving organizations, schools, special interest groups, justice systems, families and individuals. If you attend the 3-day introductory, full participation is encouraged. Other ways to get involved, if you cannot attend the Introductory Circle, or if you've been involved in the past and would like to get involved again:

Monthly Healing Circles: Occurring every 2nd Thursday of the month at Northwest Indian College 4:30PM-8PM

Leadership Team Meetings: Twice a month, Friday mornings, for community members who have attended and participated in the 3-day Introductory Peacemaking Circle and who have dedication and passion for practicing this values-based process.

3-day Introductory Peacemaking Circles: Additional trainings are scheduled throughout the year (TBA)

3-day Keeper Trainings: These are scheduled

for people who have taken part in the Introductory training and are interested in learning how to Co-Keep Circles. (TBA)

### Xwe Chi Exen Protection

Although Lummi Nation received great news in May of 2016 in regards to the Army Corp of Engineers denying a permit for development at Xwe Chi Exen (Cherry Point), elders and community members have stressed the importance of continued protection of the sacred site. Thus, regular team meetings have continued, led by the Secretary's office, and the work continues to be guided by our elders and support team.

There is a Whatcom County Public hearing that is scheduled for September 27th at the Whatcom County Council at 7PM, 311 Grand Ave regarding the recently adopted emergency moratorium of new projects at Cherry Point. While past Whatcom County Public Hearings have not been well attended by LIBC, as government-to-government discussions need to occur, general community is encouraged to participate. What the County does with the moratorium, in connection with Xwe Chi Exen, directly impacts the Lummi community and the longstanding efforts in

## Natural Resources Update

The Water Resources Division staff continued the surface and ground water ambient water quality monitoring activities on the Reservation, reviewed storm water pollution prevention plans and conducted associated inspections for several tribal development projects, conducted site visits to evaluate proposed projects as part of the Lummi land use permit process, and continued the development and maintenance of several databases.

The Water Resources Division is working with the Nooksack Tribal Natural Resources Department to conduct an interagency reconnaissance project on the Nooksack River from Everson to the Marine Drive Bridge. The purpose of these surveys is to identify and document potential illegal water withdrawals, illegal fishing activity, and illegal wastewater discharge locations along the river. Once documented in the field (i.e., GPS coordinates and photographs), further investigations will be conducted and, in principle, enforcement actions taken. So far this year, three surveys have been conducted (July 14, July 28, and August 15).

On August 23, 2016, Division staff met with Julie Horowitz and J.T. Austin, Natural Resources Policy Advisors to Governor Jay Inslee, to discuss the Washington Shellfish Initiative, the Lummi Water Settlement Initiative, the September 2014-to-present Portage Bay shellfish closure, and other natural resources topics of concern.

On August 31, 2016, an outreach letter was mailed to all residences on the Reservation that are located in the Nooksack River floodplain

or coastal flood zone. The purpose of the letter is to provide an overview of the flood hazards impacting lives and property on the Reservation, the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) and the flood insurance available to property owners and renters, issues that arise from living in a floodplain, and safety tips in case of a flood event. The floodplain outreach letter is available at the Lummi Natural Resources Department website (<http://lnnr.lummi-nsn.gov/LummiWebsite/Website.php?PageID=72>) through the

“Available Documents” section. Additionally, Division staff recently completed the Lummi Nation Floodplain Management Plan: 2016 Progress Report. This report can also be found at the website provided above.

Finally, Division staff would like to thank our Lummi Youth Program interns, Olivia Hamilton and Miles Pullar, for all of their hard work this summer. As part of their internship, Olivia and Miles developed articles discussing natural resources management is-



### GIS Division


This month the Lummi GIS Division has been working with the Lummi Shellfish Hatchery to identify areas along the Seapond Aquaculture Facility dike that are in need of repair due to natural weathering and erosion, which can compromise the

structural integrity of the dike. Rip-rap (i.e., large rock) will be used to fill and reinforce areas that have weathered and eroded in order to strengthen the dike.

A high-accuracy, mapping-grade Global Navigation Satellite System (GNSS) was used to map areas along the dike identified by Shellfish Hatchery staff as needing repair. As a result, approximately 1,252 feet of dike were identified as needing repair. Using past rock-tonnage-repair (Continued on page 7)

# Caution! Natural Disaster Hazards on the Lummi Reservation

The Lummi Nation is a federally recognized tribe with approximately 5,000 enrolled members. Roughly half of the enrolled tribal members reside on the Reservation, which is composed of the Lummi and Sandy Point peninsulas, the Nooksack and Lummi river deltas, some adjacent upland areas, Portage Island, and tidelands in Bellingham, Portage, and Lummi bays. The geographic location and the number of residents leave the Lummi Reservation vulnerable to natural disasters such as earthquakes, floods, and coastal erosion. Earthquakes are caused by convergent interactions between tectonic plates. The movement of the North American plate and the Juan de Fuca plate form the Cascadia Subduction Zone. Floods can happen near rivers, streams, and along coastlines and can cause problems that can be time consuming and costly to fix. Coastal erosion is another potential natural disaster in which water pushes and pulls against the shoreline and starts to erode the land. Coastal erosion can occur quickly or slowly over a long period of time depending

on the shoreline, natural processes, and protections in place.

The *Multi-Hazard Mitigation Plan (MHMP)* is information compiled by the Lummi Natural Resources Department (LNR) as to what actions could be taken to prevent, protect, respond to, and mitigate negative impacts to the Lummi Reservation from these kinds of natural disasters. It is a comprehensive plan with policies and procedures to ensure its effectiveness. It is a joint effort between multiple departments within the Lummi Indian Business Council (LIBC) and separate federal entities outside of the LIBC. The essential goal of the plan is to guide current and future efforts to mitigate potential disasters on the Lummi Reservation and surrounding areas. The *MHMP* identifies where natural disasters are most likely to occur, locations that pose the most threat to the tribe, and utilizes this information to decipher what improvements can be made to mitigate the potential effects of natural disasters.

The reason why it is important that we have the *MHMP* is not only because we need to protect the public health and safety of the people, but because

we also need to protect our economic development. LIBC is the third largest employer in Whatcom County, with one of the top administration buildings in Washington State. Some of our economic developments consist of our Tribal K-12 school, Early Learning Center, Head Start, Northwest Indian College, Fisherman's Cove, Lummi Nation Minimart, Skippers, the Silver Reef Hotel, Casino & Spa, Lummi Indian Business Council, the Lummi Bay shellfish and salmon hatcheries, and many other businesses. There are also many at home businesses and seasonal firework businesses that generate revenue for tribal members, as well as housing developments that provide housing for tribal members. The *MHMP* has been assembled in order to properly protect the infrastructure and economic developments on the Lummi Reservation from natural disasters and discusses plans and actions for minimizing the impacts to these important resources in the event of a natural disaster.

Several actions have been taken to protect the economic developments on the Lummi Reservation. Soils are tested and evaluated for liquefaction potential because building on

soils with high liquefaction potential is not ideal for areas where earthquakes can occur. Before construction of the Silver Reef Hotel, Casino & Spa, soils were evaluated, new soil was put in, and the land was raised to elevate it above the floodplain. To prevent damage and provide flood protection from the Nooksack River and Lummi River during small floods, a levee system has been constructed. These levees prevent water from leaving the river channel and causing damage to homes and businesses during small flood events. However, it should be noted that the current levee system was not designed to provide flood protection during large flood events, as anyone who observed the two big floods that occurred in November 1990 will remember. You may have seen some large rocks along Lummi Shore Road (between the road and the beach) and other shorelines on the Lummi Reservation that may look "out of place". These large rocks were moved here to provide bank stabilization and help reduce the impacts of coastal erosion. Bank stabilization protects coastal infrastructure and buildings because waves and debris during storms will hit the rocks rather than things like our road,

almost like a little frontline army of rocks protecting our shorelines.

The reason I wanted to address floods, earthquakes, and coastal erosion is because they are concerns for the Reservation. They are real and serious natural processes that have the potential to cause damage to our land, which is why there are so many actions being taken to keep the Reservation and surrounding areas as safe as possible. It's important we continue to stay informed of where we are most and least vulnerable and make informed, conscious decisions. As a community member I feel safer about my surroundings knowing where our weakest links are and what actions are being taken to protect Lummi.

estimates, the GIS Division calculated that approximately 1,502 tons of rock fill will be required to repair the 1,252 feet of dike. The Shellfish Hatchery will use this estimate to identify costs and secure funding for the repairs.

The GIS Division has several tools, including GNSS, computer software, printers, plotters, and hundreds of geo-spatial datasets, to fulfill a wide variety of mapping needs. # Hatchery Protection Task Force Update

The Lummi Hatchery Protection Task Force (HPTF) has been moving forward to protect and reduce legal and political risks to our hatcheries. The Task Force, which is comprised of LNR Policy and Staff, LNR Fish Commissioners, Office of the Reservation Attorney, and staff from the Sovereignty Treaty Protection Office (STPO), was created by LIBC in response to the frivolous lawsuits brought on by anti-hatchery organizations that seek to shut down hatchery production.

Along with our tribal allies at Upper Skagit and Tulalip, and former Congressman Norm Dicks and Tim Thompson, we seek to ensure that hatcheries are not only well defended, but that they are also maximized to provide fish for our people to harvest and provide the necessary mitigation for the loss of naturally produced salmon due to habitat degradation.

One of the main tactics of the Lummi HPTF has been to obtain NOAA Endangered Species Act (ESA) approval of Lummi Hatchery programs that are focused on producing salmon for terminal area. Our five Hatchery Genetic Management Plans (HGMPs) were submitted to NOAA Fisheries last December, and are now (along with the state's HGMPs within the Nooksack watershed) progressing towards ESA permitting through NOAA Fisheries under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and will be re-

viewed in an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The EIS process began with the Federal Register Notice on June 20th and will take approximately 66 weeks to complete. Upon successful completion, the hatchery programs will receive an Endangered Species Act (ESA) permit from NOAA covering hatchery operations. Our team will continue to provide technical information and expertise to NOAA in support of the analysis and review process, and we will also be prepared to defend our HGMPs from administrative or legal maneuverings by anti-hatchery organizations.

In our May update, we reported that while we had dodged a legal bullet from Wild Fish Conservancy (WFC) who had filed suit to halt release of Chambers Creek Steelhead from five watersheds, including our Nooksack watershed, that we had anticipated additional legal maneuverings

from this anti-hatchery group. As expected, WFC filed yet another legal motion in July— this time a Temporary Restraining Order (TRO) on ten Mitchell Act Hatcheries on the Columbia River. The legal motion states that NOAA is not in compliance with the Endangered Species Act (ESA) or the public process (NEPA) for failing to update their environmental review of hatchery programs, and as such, they seek to halt funding of ten Washington and Oregon State Mitchell Act hatcheries.

The Hatchery Protection Task Force will be monitoring this situation and taking any necessary actions.

This fall we, along with our tribal coalition, will continue to work towards ensuring that federal agencies prioritize and expedite HGMP review and approval and that Congress and the State provides the financial

support for this important work. We were successful in gaining \$4 million in federal funds towards HGMP approval last year, and are now advocating for additional funding in the 2017 federal budget. We will continue to engage and foster relationships with our state and federal senators and representatives so that they understand and support our need for hatcheries to provide salmon for our community. By protecting and maximizing our hatcheries, we are working to ensure that our community – through the 7th generation— will be able to practice our Schelangen and have an abundance of fish to harvest so that our treaty rights are meaningful.

My door is always open please stop by and let me know your concerns and thoughts regarding hatcheries.

## Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and Washington state tribes gather to oppose Dakota Access Pipeline

sil fuels,” said David Archambault II, Chairman of Standing Rock Sioux Tribe. “Their support is crucial in the protection of our land, water, and cultural resources, as well as all of our sovereign rights that we are asking Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works Jo-Ellen Darcy to honor.”

The peaceful gathering near Cannon Ball, North Dakota, is estimated at 1,500 people, and has inspired American Indians, celebrities, and activists from across the country to show their support for the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe. Numerous tribes have written letters to President Obama and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers asking them to fulfill their trust obligation to tribes and reconsider the construction of the Dakota Access Pipeline.

“Words can’t express how thankful we are for all of the prayers, support, letters, and donations we have received,” said Archambault. “It inspires us every day on our mission to protect this area for future generations and all who use it.”

More than 150 tribes are standing with Standing Rock on this pipeline issue, with dozens of tribes joining the camp to show their support.

The Standing Rock Sioux Tribe is arguing in court that the Dakota Access Pipeline was fast-tracked by the federal government, which is a direct violation of the Tribe’s rights as a sovereign nation because it will hurt the Tribe’s safe drinking water and historic and cultural resources. The Tribe has asked the United States government to conduct a more stringent environmental review to ensure the protection of the Tribe’s treaty rights and sacred places.

“Everyone has heard that this pipeline would be more than 1,100 miles long and would transport more than half a million barrels of crude oil every day across our lands,” said Cedric Good House, a traditional leader for the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe. “What they don’t know are the irreplaceable sacred places across the landscape and the deep cultural and

spiritual knowledge that is tied to them. These are the places and the knowledge that make us who we are today as a tribe. I plan on telling my grandchildren about the time when tribes across the country stood up and fought for treaty, culture, and the future. And we fought for the future of safe drinking water for all Americans. No longer is the world watching us, the world is with us.”

Yakama is humbled and honored to stand beside our brothers and sisters of the Standing Rock Sioux. **Subject: Lummi Nation Stands in Solidarity with the Standing Rock Sioux**

Dear Standing Rock Sioux,

It is my understanding that the Dakota Access Pipeline will transport crude oil through the Dakotas, Iowa, and Illinois. Not long ago the Lummi Nation faced a similar situation that the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe faces today. In the most recent years, the Gateway Pacific Terminal (GPT) attempted numerous times to secure permits to build a coal port at Cherry Point, otherwise known as *Xwe'Chi'eXen* to the Lummi people.

Between 2011 and 2016 the Lummi Indian Business Council (LIBC) communicated very often with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) in regards to the GPT proposed project. Through dedication, consistency, and perseverance, the LIBC gathered enough evidence and conveyed this message to the Corps that the GPT would negatively impact our: treaty rights, homelands, and sacred sites. May 9, 2016 was a testament to our leadership when Col. John Buck of the Corps issued a decision that rejected the permit for the GPT project.

Ultimately, we hope that the Corps can intervene and or assist the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe in protecting your: ancestral lands, treaty rights, and culture. The U.S. federal government is responsible for upholding a government-to-government with treaty tribes and do what is right, and that is honoring your rights as a sovereign nation. In closing, the Lummi Nation stands in solidarity with the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe.

Assistant Secretary Darcy:

We are writing to express our grave concerns regarding actions taken by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers ("Corps") that appear to violate not only federal law, but also the Treaty Rights of the Standing Rock Sioux. We are deeply troubled by the Corps' apparent willingness to abdicate its solemn trust responsibility owed to the Lakota and Sioux People by allowing the construction of the Dakota Access Pipeline ("DAPL"). The DAPL will unquestionably due irreparable harm to many historic and cultural sites that are significant to, and inextricably connected with, the people of the Standing Rock Sioux Indian Reservation. We were therefore shocked to learn of the Corps' abject failure to abide by not only the spirit, but also the letter, of Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.


We know that you can do better.

Whatcom County Council recently adopted an emergency moratorium on accepting applications for new projects at Xwe'chi'eXen (Cherry Point) that could be used to export unrefined fossil fuels. The emergency moratorium went into effect immediately, will last for two months and is intended to buy time for the County Council and the Planning Commission to revise land use rules in the Xwe'chi'eXen (Cherry Point) Heavy Industrial Zone. The new land use rules will be designed to prevent construction associated with the export of unrefined fossil fuels.

This emergency ordinance and its extension limits construction or expansion of pipelines, oil train facilities, or shipping infrastructure that could be used for crude oil, natural gas, coal or other unrefined fossil fuels. The rule does not apply retroactively to permits applications that have already been submitted, such as Gateway Pacific, but would limit future project applications at that site.

The emergency ordinance was introduced by Councilmember Barry Buchanan and was passed 7-0. The extension of the emergency moratorium will have a public hearing on September 27th. There needs to be government-to-government discussions before the County considers or adopts final land use rules in 2017.

## NATIONAL ALCOHOL AND DRUG ADDICTION RECOVERY MONTH, 2016

### BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA A PROCLAMATION

Every day, millions of Americans prove that recovery from alcohol and substance use disorders is possible -- yet at the same time, millions more are struggling with the disease of addiction. These individuals are our family members, friends, and neighbors, and when they are not able to get the help they need, our communities and our country are not as strong as they can be. It is up to all of us to help our loved ones seek life-saving services when needed and steer them toward recovery. Throughout this month, we celebrate the successes of all those who know the transformative power of recovery, and we renew our commitment to providing the support, care, and treatment that people need to forge a healthier life.

Substance use disorder, commonly known as addiction, is a disease of the brain, and many misconceptions surrounding it have contributed to harmful stigmas that can prevent individuals from seeking the treatment they need. By treating substance use disorders as seriously as other medical conditions, with an emphasis on prevention and treatment, people can recover. This month's theme is, "Join the Voices for Recovery: Our Families, Our Stories, Our Recovery!". Focusing on the importance of family support throughout recovery, it invites families, loved ones, and other individuals to share their stories and triumphs in fighting substance use disorders to inspire others that may follow in their footsteps. I encourage all Americans looking for assistance to use the "Treatment Locator" tool at [www.SAMHSA.gov](http://www.SAMHSA.gov) or call 1-800-662-HELP.

This disease can touch any American in any community, and my Administration has made combatting substance use disorders a priority. Under the Affordable Care Act, insurance companies must now cover substance use disorder services as essential health benefits. The Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act requires health plans that cover mental health and substance use disorder treatment to provide coverage that is comparable to that of medical and surgical care. Through our National Drug Control Strategy -- a 21st century approach to reducing drug use and its consequences -- we have promoted evidence-based health and safety initiatives that aim to prevent drug use, increase opportunities for early intervention and integrated treatment in health care, and support recovery. In response to our Nation's opioid overdose epidemic, we are highlighting tools that can help reduce drug use and overdose, such as evidence-based prevention programs, prescription drug take back events, medication-assisted treatment for people with opioid use disorders, and the overdose reversal drug naloxone. That is why, in my most recent budget proposal, I proposed investing \$1 billion to expand access to treatment for prescription opioid misuse and heroin use. I will continue urging the Congress to fund treatment like I have proposed -- because if they fund these efforts, we can help more individuals across our country seek help, complete treatment, and sustain recovery.

During National Alcohol and Drug Addiction Recovery Month, let us thank health care profes-

sionals, support groups, and all those dedicated to helping individuals in need find assistance and reclaim their lives. Let us continue working to address substance use disorders in our communities and promote the health, safety, and prosperity of the American people.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim September 2016 as National Alcohol and Drug Addiction Recovery Month. I call upon the people of the United States to observe this month with appropriate programs, ceremonies, and activities.

### Inslee and agency leaders to discuss forest health, fires and outdoor recreation

Gov. Jay Inslee will meet with Commissioner of Public Lands Peter Goldmark and other state leaders, on Tuesday to discuss efforts to reduce forest fires, promote healthier forests and increase public use of state lands and waters.

As part of his Results Washington initiative, Inslee has set dozens of goals related to education, the economy, public health and other areas.

His environmental goals include increasing efforts to make the state's forests more fire-resilient and healthy, as well as increasing public participation in outdoor recreation. At Tuesday's meeting, the group will discuss those efforts, including a new construction technology

that uses small-diameter timber. The meeting will also include updates on the number of hunting and fishing licenses in Washington and the number of Discover Passes and daily parks permits.

Results Washington uses data, inter-agency collaboration and customer feedback to make state government more effective. More than half the initiative's nearly 200 measures are on track to meet or beat targets.

before the Committee in May about the urgent need to pass their bill to implement solutions that would address the overwhelming obstacles Native children face – including experiencing levels of post-traumatic stress similar to newly returning veterans from Iraq and Afghanistan dramatically increased risks of suicide, and lower high school graduation rates than any racial or ethnic demographic in the country. Heitkamp and Murkowski's bill would work to address these and other challenges to promote better outcomes for Native youth.

Specifically, Heitkamp and Murkowski's bill would create a Commission on Native Children to identify the complex challenges facing Native children in North Dakota, Alaska, and across the United States by conducting an intensive study on these issues – including high rates of poverty, staggering unemployment, child abuse, domestic violence, crime, substance abuse, and dire economic opportunities – and making recommendations on how to make sure Native children get the protections, as well as economic and educational tools they need to thrive.

"Every day, children across Indian Country wake up with the odds stacked against them – but the U.S. Congress spoke with one resounding voice to change that," said Heitkamp. "For generations, young people living on tribal lands have been exposed to some of the most insurmountable barriers to their success – from living in dilapidated homes, to experiencing abuse and severe lack of educational and economic opportunity. Our Native youth have had much to overcome without much help from the federal government. But by unanimously passing our bipartisan bill, the U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate have united to change course – and to help light a better path for our Native young people. It's been my priority since before I came to the Senate to work to urgently improve outcomes for our Native youth – that's why this legislation was the first I introduced as a U.S. Senator. I'll keep fighting to make sure our Native young people are heard, and given the opportunities that every American

child deserves."

"I can cite many examples of young Native people who are living healthy lives and doing great things for their people. Yet far too have found themselves in a world of despair," said Murkowski. "There is an urgent need for a broad range of stakeholders to come to the table and formulate plans to give every young Native person a fighting chance at a productive life. This 'high energy' commission, established in memory of the late Dr. Walter Soboleff, a treasured Alaska Native elder and culture bearer and a champion for Native youth moves the needle in a new and badly needed direction."

The Alyce Spotted Bear and Walter Soboleff Commission on Native Children, named for the former Chairwoman of Mandan, Hidatsa & Arikara Nation in North Dakota, and Alaska Native Elder and statesman, respectively, has gained widespread praise by a cross-section of tribal leaders and organizations from North Dakota, Alaska, and around the country. It has been lauded by former Chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs Byron Dorgan, the National Congress of American Indians, and the National Indian Education Association, among others.

Background:

Conditions for young people in Indian Country are tragic. For example:

- More than one in three American Indian and Alaska Native children live in poverty.

- Suicide rates for Native children ages 15-24 years old are 2.5 times the national average and is the second-leading cause of death in that age group.

- While the overall rate of child mortality in the U.S. has decreased since 2000, the rate for Native children has increased 15 percent.

- At 67 percent, American Indian and Alaska Native students had the lowest four year high school graduation rate of any racial or ethnic group

in the 2011-2012 school year.

- 60 percent of American Indian schools do not have adequate high-speed internet or digital technology to meet the requirements of college and career ready standards.

Tribal governments face numerous obstacles in responding to the needs of Native children. Existing programmatic rules and the volume of resources required to access grant opportunities stymie efforts of tribes to tackle these issues. At the same time, federal agencies lack clear guidance about the direction that should be taken to best address the needs of Native children to fulfill our trust responsibility to tribal nations.

To help reverse these impacts, the Commission on Native Children would conduct a comprehensive study on the programs, grants, and supports available for Native children, both at government agencies and on the ground in Native communities, with the goal of developing a sustainable system that delivers wrap-around

services to Native children. Then, the 11-member Commission would issue a report to address a series of challenges currently facing Native children. A Native Children Subcommittee would also provide advice to the Commission. The Commission's report would address how to achieve:

- *Better Use of Existing Resources – The Commission will identify ways to streamline current federal, state, and local programs to be more effective and give tribes greater flexibility to devise programs for their communities in the spirit of self-determination and allow government agencies to redirect resources to the areas of most need.*

- *Increased Coordination – The Commission will seek to improve coordination of existing programs benefitting Native children. The federal government houses numerous different agencies, yet these programs too often do not work together.*

- *Measurable Outcomes – The Commission will recommend measures to determine the wellbeing of Native children, and use these measurements to propose short-term, mid-term, and long-term national policy goals.*

- *Stronger Data – The Commission will seek to develop better data collection methods. Too often Native children are left out of the conversation because existing data collection, reporting, and analysis practices exclude them.*

- *Stronger Private Sector Partnerships – The Commission will seek to identify obstacles to public-private partnerships in Native communities.*

- *Implementation of Best Practices – The Commission will identify and highlight successful models that can be adopted in Native communities.*





## Joint Statement from the Department of Justice, the Department of the Army and the Department of the Interior Regarding Standing Rock Sioux Tribe v. U.S. Army Corps of Engineers

Department of Justice

The Department of Justice, the Department of the Army and the Department of the Interior issued the following statement regarding Standing Rock Sioux Tribe v. U.S. Army Corps of Engineers:

“We appreciate the District Court’s opinion on the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers’ compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act. However, important issues raised by the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and other tribal nations and their members regarding the Dakota Access pipeline specifically, and pipeline-related decision-making generally, remain. Therefore, the Department of the Army, the Department of Justice, and the Department of the Interior will take the following steps.

The Army will not authorize constructing the Dakota Access pipeline on Corps land bordering or under Lake Oahe until it can determine whether it will need to reconsider any of its previous decisions regarding the Lake Oahe site under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) or other federal laws. Therefore, construction of the pipeline on Army Corps land bordering or under Lake Oahe will not go forward at this time. The Army will move expeditiously to make this determination, as everyone involved — including the pipeline company and its workers — deserves a clear and timely resolution. In the interim, we request that the pipeline company voluntarily pause all construction activity within 20 miles east or west of Lake Oahe.

“Furthermore, this case has highlighted the need for a serious discussion on whether there should be

nationwide reform with respect to considering tribes’ views on these types of infrastructure projects. Therefore, this fall, we will invite tribes to formal, government-to-government consultations on two questions: (1) within the existing statutory framework, what should the federal government do to better ensure meaningful tribal input into infrastructure-related reviews and decisions and the protection of tribal lands, resources, and treaty rights; and (2) should new legislation be proposed to Congress to alter that statutory framework and promote those goals.

“Finally, we fully support the rights of all Americans to assemble and speak freely. We urge everyone involved in protest or pipeline activities to adhere to the principles of nonviolence. Of course, anyone who commits violent or destructive acts may face criminal sanctions from

federal, tribal, state, or local authorities. The Departments of Justice and the Interior will continue to deploy resources to North Dakota to help state, local, and tribal authorities, and the communities they serve, better communicate, defuse tensions, support peaceful protest, and maintain public safety.

from scores of sovereign tribal governments, to exercise their First Amendment rights and to voice heartfelt concerns about the environment and historic, sacred sites. It is now incumbent on all of us to develop a path forward that serves the broadest public interest.”





 1. The Lummi Nation Child Support Program has started an action in the Lummi Tribal Court requesting establishment of an order of child support. Additional requests, if any, are stated in the petition, a copy of which can be obtained at the Lummi Nation Child Support Program located at 2665 Kwina Rd. Bellingham, WA 98226.  
 2. You must respond to this summons and the petition by filing a written response with the Lummi Tribal Court and serving the Petitioner with the written response. A response form can be obtained from the Lummi Nation Child Support Office at the address provided above. If you do not file a written response within 21 days after the date this summons was served on you, or fail to appear at a hearing for establishment of child support, the court may enter a default judgment against you granting the relief requested in the petition.  
 3. The Respondent's employer or others with evidence of the parent's income may be required to provide the court with records of his or her income.  
 4. If there is no reliable evidence of the Respondent's income, income will be imputed according to the Child Support Guidelines.  
 5. If the Respondent's income is reduced as a matter of choice or not for reasonable cause, the court will attribute income up to the parent's earning capacity.  
 6. You may enter into a support agreement with the other parties as allowed under the Lummi Code of Laws.  
 7. If you wish to seek the advice of an attorney in this matter, you should do so promptly so that your response, if any, may be made by the deadline.



## THE FLU & YOU

### What is influenza (the flu)?

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. It can cause mild to severe illness. At times, it can lead to death.

### Who should get a flu vaccine?

Everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine, especially if you are at high risk for complications, or if you live with or care for someone who is high risk for complications.

### Your family may be especially vulnerable to the flu.

Influenza poses a greater risk to certain people, including pregnant women, children, and elders, who are all at high risk for flu-related complications. In fact, pneumonia and flu are a leading cause of death among Native elders. The flu also can cause certain health conditions, including diabetes, asthma, and heart and lung disease, to become worse. Pneumonia and bronchitis are examples of serious flu-related complications, which can result in hospitalization and sometimes even death.

## SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS OF THE FLU

People sick with influenza feel some or all of these symptoms:

- Fever\* or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue (very tired)
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

*\*Not everyone with the flu will have a fever. You can be sick and contagious without running a temperature.*

## HELP PREVENT THE SPREAD OF THE FLU

- Get a flu vaccine each year.
- Stop the spread of germs, including influenza viruses:
  - Cover your coughs and sneezes
  - Wash your hands often
  - If you're sick, stay home
- Take antiviral drugs if they are prescribed for you.


